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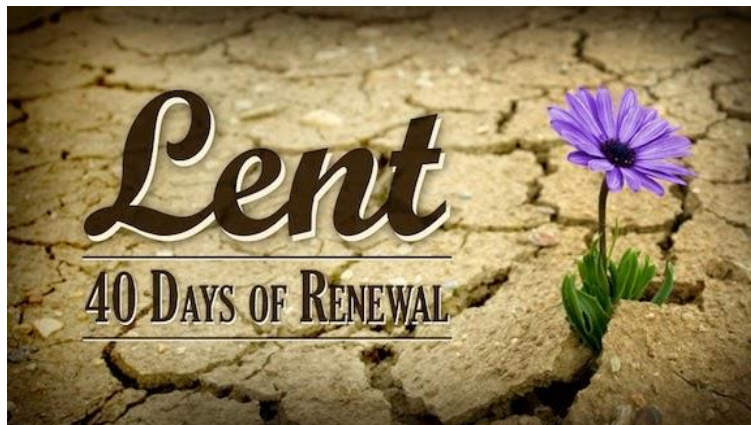

Tending the Garden of the Soul: A Lenten Reflection

Dear Catholic Daughters,

One of my favorite hobbies is gardening, especially taking care of my roses. Recently, I found myself in the thick of it: removing dead branches that no longer belonged, thinning out the overgrowth, clearing weeds from the base, and aerating the soil to let the roots breathe. As I worked, I realized that this physical labor is a living parable for the spiritual work we are called to do right now.

The Interior Desert

By the liturgical calendar, we are well into the season of Lent—that reflective season of mystery and the solemn season of our own mortality. It is a 40-day journey (not counting Sundays) that leads us to the threshold of the **Sacred Triduum**.

Much like the winter cold, these spiritual practices draw us inward. In Mark's Gospel, we see the baptism and the temptation of Christ as two sides of the same coin:

“And just as [Jesus] was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him... And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan.” (Mark 1:10-13)

Lent is about **revelation**. The desert the Spirit sends us into is most often found *within* us. Revelation is not just seeing what has been revealed; it is about owning it and growing into it. Jesus had a revelation that changed His relationship with the One He knew as *Abba*, Father. That revelation changed His life—and the lives of billions throughout history.

Pruning the Heart

Lent demands that we, like the One we follow, come to understand our relationship with the Holy in new, deeper, and more human ways. It brings us back year after year to peer into the "tombs" we have constructed for ourselves—tombs hewn from shame, fear, or trauma.

A prayerful Lent gives us the strength to:

- **Identify the "Deadwood":** Removing the habits and thoughts that no longer serve our journey with Christ.
- **Roll Back the Stones:** To move the heavy obstacles of pride or guilt that seal us off from love, life, and the good work of justice.
- **Aerate the Soil:** To open our hearts so that grace can actually reach the roots of our being.

Beyond the Tomb

It is hard work to enter willingly into the dark spaces of our hearts. Often, we want to leave long before the work is done—long before we can comprehend what God holds for us, and long before we are willing to own the prayer of **St. Teresa of Ávila**: *that Christ has no hands but ours*.

Still, the seasons turn. With or without us, spring fulfills her promise of warmth and greening. What seemed dead will teem with new life. If we stay the course and do the "holy gardening" required, the stones will roll away from the tombs in our hearts. Something beyond our current understanding will emerge to tend the garden that is this world.

Overview of the 61st Biennial National Convention in Coralville, Iowa

In the first week of February, the National CDA Board met at the Hyatt Regency, which will serve as the host hotel for the 61st Biennial National Convention. While in Coralville, the Board worked closely with Iowa State Regent and Convention Chairman Brenda Vore, as well as Convention Co-chair Julie Marlow along with various committee members. Their collaborative efforts focused on reviewing and finalizing the plans for the upcoming event, scheduled to take place July 22–26, 2026.

The Hyatt Regency, as the host hotel, provides guests with a variety of appealing amenities. Additional options are available at the overflow hotels—Staybridge Suites, Drury Inn & Suites, and Homewood Suites by Hilton—all of which feature modern facilities and are located within walking distance of the main venue. The entire convention area was recently renovated, offering a contemporary atmosphere and convenient access to local restaurants and shopping centers.

Attendees seeking outdoor experiences will find several walking trails just outside the Hyatt Regency. The nearby Iowa River offers opportunities for birdwatching and enjoying fresh air, enhancing the overall environment for convention guests.

The closest airport to Coralville is at Cedar Rapids (CID), located approximately 20 miles from the host hotel. This small, easy-to-navigate airport provides convenient travel options, with Uber and taxi services available for transportation to and from the convention area.

A special highlight of the convention will be a Tuesday evening performance by the Brown Family, well-known gospel singers from Iowa.

Friday night's "Fun Night" promises a festive state fair-inspired atmosphere, featuring deep-fried favorites and a cornhole tournament. Attendees are encouraged to bring their hats, boots, and cowboy attire to join in the fun!

Detailed information will be forthcoming in the March Quarterly. Everything you need to plan your stay will be available in this newsletter. This will be a very busy convention but also very enjoyable! Looking forward to seeing you in Coralville, Iowa in July!

A Car Thief, a Police K9 and Mercy

At the 2025 Convention, I mentioned I would write and tell about an incident I had that involved mercy and kindness. I thought about sharing this story then as now because one thing we have noticed in the state board is although our motto is “Unity and Charity,” we are not always unified nor charitable with kindness and forgiveness. Let us mull over this during Lent 2026 and see if we can all increase our kindness and forgiveness.

I was a Police Reserve Officer for the Concord Police Department. From the time I had been a Police Explorer until the mid to late 1980s, there was a man who whenever you saw this man in a car, the car would be a stolen car. He was a car thief through and through. On a particular day he had been stopped in a stolen car and would not get out. A police K9 was sent in through the open window to get him out. He came out – with a lot of dog bite puncture wounds.

One of the duties of a Reserve Officer was to transport prisoners from the jail to the county jail until their arraignment in court. So, I was assigned to take this man to the county jail but first, I would have to take him to the county hospital to have the dog bites treated. The doctor explained what had to be done to clean out the wounds and this man asked me, “Will you hold my hand, this is gonna hurt a lot!” I said “okay” and held his hands. He said, “Don’t you tell anyone!” and I said, “Don’t **you** tell anyone!” We both had to protect our reputation after all.

A few years later this man was killed in jail by another inmate. He was trying to help protect a sheriff’s deputy who had been jumped. I thought about “our incident” and wondered at the mercy and kindness involved in that moment. Some might say he did not deserve mercy or compassion. Some might say God was present in that moment to touch my heart to treat this man as one of God’s children. I just know that mercy is never wasted and as Past State Chaplain, Father Erick Villa quotes his grandmother, “You can never go wrong with kindness.”

I recently heard a phrase “Stand in Unity-no sunlight between.” This is where we should be as an organization – shoulder to shoulder standing in Unity, not allowing the outside world to pull us apart. Please, during this Lent, consider reflecting on your mercy and kindness. We do not always have to agree with each other, but we can agree to disagree. We have By-Laws, Standing Rules, and Procedures and Protocols to help us all play on a level playing field. We have phones, emails and texts to close the communication gap. Let us be charitable with kindness, let us be closer to each other and let us be closer to God.

As always, I need you all as my sisters in Christ, and if you do not cooperate...I still know a few K9s

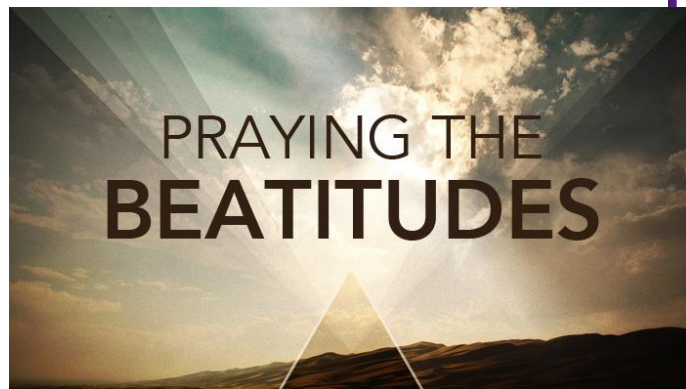


Are You Living the Beatitudes?

The Beatitudes are well-known scripture from the Sermon on the Mount (*Matthew 5:3-10*). Jesus speaks about the eight “blessing” that describes the teachings of followers of Jesus. The Beatitudes are our roadmap to living a Christian and blessed life.

The word “beatitude” originates from the Latin *beatus*, meaning “blessed” or “happy,” and *beatitudo*, which translates to “blessedness” or “state of happiness.”

During a recent homily by my Church’s Deacon, he reminded us of what the Beatitudes can do to help us live a blessed life. He asked the children and adults to commit to practicing at least one of the Beatitudes. Start with one that resonates deeply with you and add the others in your life. In these troubled times, when so many seemed to have lost their way, let us do what the Beatitudes teach us to “do” to follow God’s will and embrace His grace.



The Beatitudes in the book of Matthew are not a random listing of principles. Each of these Beatitudes flows from the one that went before. As you reflect on the Beatitudes, ask yourself, “Are these the things I am pursuing?”

“Blessed are the poor in spirit, for the kingdom of heaven is theirs.
 Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
 Blessed are the humble, for they will inherit the earth.
 Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
 Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.
 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
 Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God.
 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for the kingdom of heaven is theirs.”

The Beatitudes are the roadmap for spiritual growth, teaching us to live with humility, seek holiness, and show mercy and peace.

6. The egg dance is an Easter tradition in Germany. People put eggs on the floor and dance around them, trying not to break any. In Germany, egg dance is the Easter tradition.
7. In Greece, Easter Eggs are red to represent Christ's blood.
8. Did you know that there is a symbolism associated with the decoration of eggs in hard shells? Actually, the shell in Christian and Orthodox cultures represents the sealed tomb that held Christ's body. When cracked open it mimics his resurrection.
9. In the sixteenth century Northern England and Scotland, children would go from door to door reciting rhymes and in return received eggs, cheese, bacon and other items for their families' Easter meals. This practice was called "pace egging," where eggs were given as Easter offerings. This practice is similar to Halloween trick-or-treating.

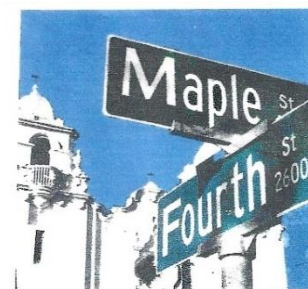

Back to business at hand, we are fast approaching midterm elections. Just a few points that you need to know. If you are not registered to vote, you may go to <https://sos.ca.gov/elections> to register online or print a mail-in form. Information is available concerning the primary elections in California.

Primary Election - June 2, 2026

- **The last day to register to vote for the June 2, 2026, Primary Election is May 18, 2026.**
- All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the June 2, 2026, Primary Election.
 - Your county elections office will begin mailing ballots by May 4, 2026.
 - Ballot drop-off locations open on May 5, 2026.
 - Vote-by-mail ballots can be returned by mail, at a drop-off location, or your county elections office.
 - Vote centers open for early in-person voting in all Voter's Choice Act counties beginning on May 23, 2026.
 - Vote-by-mail ballots must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by June 9, 2026.

On a final note, remember, if you work for a political candidate, a proposition on the ballot or your political party, you must represent yourself in your opinions and not the Catholic Daughters. Do not use phrases such as "The Catholic Daughters support ...", or "As a Catholic Daughter I support .." or some similar phrase of support. Your opinion must be represented as your opinion only.

Personally, I wish you safe travels this Easter season. Celebrate the Resurrection of Christ with family and friends.

March 30, 2026, the first day of spring. SPRING! A time of renewal. First flower buds. First birds return to the yard. A week later is Palm Sunday, the biggest celebration of the liturgical year. We are getting ready for The King to enter the city. Some parishes will host elaborate Via Crucis/Stations of the Cross. The Sunday next will be Easter. Bright Pastels will color the pews. Many will have on new outfits. For some families, this gathering will be second only to the Month of Christmas! What Joy!

For some, the great joy most of us are feeling will be bittersweet. Their family's springtime "firsts" will include the first Palm Sunday and Easter without a loved one. The first without the grandmother who brought Easter baskets for all of the grandkids, no matter how old they were. The first without the grandfather who hid eggs throughout the backyard – after he changed out of his dapper Easter suit. There will be adult children taking over their parents' roles of preparing the Easter lamb or roast. Young adults realize that this year will be their first without a care package in their mailbox. With the new flower buds there will be a fresh wave of tears.

Whether their mourning has just begun or is nearing a year, this first will be new. New as the first day of spring. As you encounter your friends, family, coworkers, and neighbors experiencing this set of "firsts" be patient. Patiently wait for them to emerge from their dark soil of grief. Offer a kind word but make it true and meaningful. Did their loved one bake the best holiday treat? Share a joyful moment. Offer a listening ear, maybe they need to tell you about the joy their loved one brought. Your kindness can be a fount of living water (Jn 4:14). How many times have you felt God's grace and presence in the small kindness someone offered you?

Spring and Easter are times of renewal. We prepare with the solemnness of Ash Wednesday. We are told "Repent and believe in the Gospel," as the clergy place ashes on our forehead. We hope to emerge at the end of those 40 days feeling stronger spiritually. Perhaps, you gave up a favorite snack. Are you giving up coffee? I hope everyone around you is ok! Maybe it is something you are adding to your life. Are you spending time with a local charity? May the smile on your face bring great joy!

This April marks fifty years since my first sad Easter. An early morning call from the nursing home to tell my mother that her father, my Grandpa, had died. I cried so much that by the time my mother got me settled down, everyone else on the floor of our apartment building was awake. Some went to mass. My pink suit would not be worn that day. When the other kids knocked on our door to ask if I was coming outside, my mother said I was "too upset to go out." In reality, my six-year-old self had bounced back enough to want to play with my friends. As traumatic as that seemed, at the time, that would not be my only Holy Week of Sadness. In all, my grandfather, my mother, and my grandaunt all died or were buried between Palm Saturday and Easter Sunday.

While you might expect spring to be the saddest time of year for me, it is not. My favorite liturgical time of the year is EASTER! Why? Because Jesus Christ was celebrated, betrayed, tried, crucified, laid in a tomb, and ROSE on the third day! This is what we believe and thus I have FAITH! (Lk 19:28 – 24:53)

Faith allows us to believe that the priest can change bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ. Faith allows us to believe in the power of prayer. It is our faith that helps us accept when

our prayers are not answered as we would have liked. But during the “Year of Firsts” it can be hard to maintain your faith. That is where you come in, Sister! You can be there to lift up loudly or sit quietly. May you have enough faith to be the spiritual crutch someone needs to walk through their journey.

Spring is a time of renewal. I pray the greatest thing you find renewed is your faith. May your faith and the faith of those around you be renewed as you emerge into the newness of SPRING!

What is your Nard?

Lent invites us into the holy work of examination—not only of our sins, but of our love. It asks us to look closely at what we are willing to give, what we hold back, and what

it truly means to follow Christ with our whole hearts.

In the Gospel, we meet Mary of Bethany, a woman who understands this invitation deeply. She approaches Jesus quietly, carrying an alabaster jar of pure nard—rare, costly, and precious. Without hesitation, she breaks it open and pours it out for Him. Scripture tells us that the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. This is not a story about extravagance. It is a story about surrender.

Mary’s nard represented something saved, something valuable, something that could not be replaced. In offering it freely, she shows us that true worship is never cautious. It is wholehearted. It is trusting. It is willing to be misunderstood.

Lent asks us the same question: What is my nard?

For many of us in Catholic Daughters of the Americas—our nard is poured out quietly. It may be time given when we are already tired, compassion offered when no one is watching, leadership accepted with humility, or service rendered without applause. Cards sent. Prayers whispered. Hands held in silence. Needs met before they are ever spoken.

Like Mary, we may never stand at the center of the room. Yet when our service is offered in love, the fragrance fills the house.

During Lent, the world may tell us that our efforts are too small, too hidden, or too costly. But Jesus reminds us that love given to God is never wasted.

As we journey toward Easter, we remember that Mary's act prepared Christ for burial. What looked like loss was actually preparation for resurrection. In the same way, our Lenten sacrifices—when united with Christ—become seeds of new life.

Lent teaches us to pour ourselves out. Easter reminds us that nothing poured out in love is ever lost.

Loving God, during this holy season of Lent, teach us to offer our lives generously and without fear. Give us hearts like Mary of Bethany—willing to pour out what is precious in love and trust. Help us to serve quietly, faithfully, and courageously, even when our sacrifices go unseen. Unite our prayers, fasting, and acts of charity with the sacrifice of Your Son, and prepare our hearts for the joy of Easter. May the fragrance of our service bring hope, healing, and grace to all we encounter. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

A Time of Challenge for the Church in the United States¹



Over the past 30 years, the Catholic Church in the United States has experienced a profound decline in participation. More than 50 million Catholics have stopped practicing the faith, and over half of all American adults raised Catholic have now left the Church. Only 8 percent say they could imagine returning.

These shifts have had serious consequences. For the past 35 years, a Catholic parish has closed every three days, and for the past 25 years, a Catholic school has closed every four days. Today, 3,500 U.S. parishes no longer have a resident priest.

The priesthood itself has changed dramatically. In 1973, there were 58,000 priests in the U.S., with an average age of 35. Only 10 percent were over 65. Today, there are 37,000 priests, the average age is 64, and 40 percent are over 65. Over the past 50 years, the Church has lost one active priest per day due to retirement, death, or departure from ministry.

These realities point to more than a decline in numbers—they reflect a deep disconnection between many Catholics and the Church that formed them. As faithful women committed to prayer, service, and leadership, Catholic Daughters are uniquely positioned to respond with hope, witness, and renewed commitment to the life of the Church.

This moment calls for honesty, faith, and trust that the Holy Spirit continues to work, even in times of great challenge.

Dear CDA Sisters united in Parliamentary Procedure,

If your Court does not have the current version of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (RONR) 3rd Edition, please order yours soon. It is the proper tool to have and to reference at your meetings. As 2026 takes shape and the world strives to find balance, Lent is a perfect time to talk about how we can counterbalance our inner child with Lenten reflection and in an odd twist, how Parliamentary Procedures provides direction, too.

Stability! Isn't that what we all seek? Our lives find stability when we take steps to listen and observe while treating decisions with spiritual discernment. Lent invites us to slow down and act deliberately rather than impulsively. Parliamentary procedure requires waiting your turn, speaking with purpose, and honoring process. It gives us opportunities to *fast* from chaos, ego, or individual control. This intentional slowing invites us not only to listen, but also to recognize when "reconsideration" is necessary.

Lent values silence and attention while Procedure values reflection and a call back to "order." Parliamentary procedure allows reflection for motions to be corrected, withdrawn, amended, or reconsidered. In our families and parish, what does it mean to "amend" our position, how can grace be built into how we conduct meetings? How does admitting error strengthen—not weaken—the CDA community? Try to commit to *one Lenten practice* of listening fully, speaking briefly, and honoring dissent.

Final thoughts! Soon, your courts will be forming a Nominations Committee. The act of taking nominations creates a space where a calling matters more than ambition. Are you discerning the call? Maybe it has not come to you yet? Let us reframe: *nominating* someone else is an act of humility and recognition. *Accepting a nomination* can be an act of faith rather than self-assertion. The nominating committee selects the candidates that it feels are most competent; The floor must always be opened for additional nominations. Check both your "Tools of the Trade" Bylaws for the duties of the Nominating Committee and Robert's Rules on how to proceed correctly.

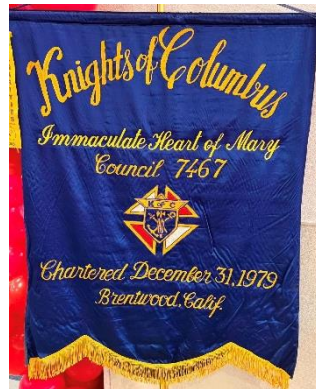
